5. A) Aspects of language: Analyze the discourse of one of the passages below by answering the questions on it:

Ladies and gentleman, the difficulty of democracy, as a form of government, is that it demands a readiness for compromise. The beaten party must not consider that a principle is involved of such importance as to make it pusillanimous to yield; on the other hand, the majority must not press the advantage to the point at which it provokes a revolt. This requires practice, respect for the law, and habit of believing that opinions other than one's own may not be proof of wickedness. What is even more necessary, there must not be a state of acute fear, for when there is such a state, men look for a leader and submit to him when found, with the result that he probably becomes a dictator. Given these conditions, let me tell you, democracy is capable of being the most stable form of government hitherto devised. In the United States, Great, the Dominions, Scandinavia and Switzerland, it runs hardly any danger except from without; in France it is becoming more and more firmly established. Yes. Ladies and Gentleman, and in addition to stability, it has the merit of making government pay some attention to the welfare of their subjects-not perhaps, as much as might be wished, but very much more that is shown by absolute monarchies, oligarchies or dictatorships.
